Citizen Science Team ID's 740 Bugs!

Illinois RiverWatch Open Lab Well Attended

Eight USRC citizen scientists attended the Illinois RiverWatch Open Lab at the Izaak Walton Cabin at Lake of the Woods on July 6. With assistance from Illinois RiverWatch's Hannah Griffis, the volunteers identified 740 macro-invertebrate that are used as indicators of stream quality. To determine stream quality rating, three indexes are used. One of the indexes includes Taxa Richness, which are the number of different kinds of bugs found. There are 37 possible indicators that are used. EPT Taxa Richness is also taken into account, which is the number of different Mayflies, Caddisflies and Stoneflies found in the samples. These are the good indicators of stream quality. Finally, the Macroinvertebrate Biotic Index (MBI) is calculated. This is the average taxa value of all the bugs found at a monitoring site. This years results suggests that the small streams monitored are generally of poor quality, while the Sangamon River has ratings between good and excellent.

Adopt-a-Highway and Invasive Species Removal Cooordinator. "The effort resulted in 10 large bags of trash removed from our roadsides. Additionally, the workers gathered cut honeysuckle stumps at the Mahomet Greenway Park for later burning."

"The USRC would also like to extend gratitude to Mickey Nickrent from Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church, and Christina Brown and Emily Polonus, both Champaign Catholic Heart Work Camp Managers for offering volunteers to the Upper Sangamon River Conservancy," said Joe. The CHWC volunteers worked through an especially oppressive week of heat and humidity while maintaining a positive outlook.



August Mussel Surveys: A Call for Volunteers

The USRC/Illinois RiverWatch joint mussel project title, Freshwater Mussels of the Upper Sangamon River: Community Science in Action, begins its second year of a 10-year study. Four surveys are scheduled for August, and volunteers are still needed. More than 100 volunteers answered the call last year. The purpose of the project is to illustrate how regular citizens, called community scientists or citizen scientists, can make an important contribution to the advancement of scientific knowledge. At the same time, volunteers are provided the opportunity to learn first hand about the



amazing diversity, and fascinating life history of freshwater mussels in the Sangamon River. The amateur malacologists will comb their hands through the substrate of the river searching for freshwater mussels. Once gathered, they will help to tag, identify, count, measure, weigh, and photograph the mussels before returning them to their river home. The USRC provides lunch for the volunteers.



USRC and Illinois RiverWatch have partners in research and education for this project that include Illinois Natural History Survey, Missouri Botanical Garden, St. Louis Zoo, and National Great Rivers Research and Education Center (NGRREC). Funding for the project has come from NGRREC, the Living Earth Collaborative, and the Consortuim of Universities for the Advancement of Hydrologic Science, Inc. (CUAHSI). Sangamon River Runners' June Float

An enjoyable trip In spite of a little rain

USRC's Sangamon River Runners' June float trip included seven boaters on an 'exploratory float trip' from the Sangamon River Forest Preserve near County Road 600 south of Fisher down Riverwood, Scott Hays' home on the river between the Hazen Bridge and Lake of the Woods. The trip was approximately five miles and was completed in just under 5 hours. As an exploratory trip, this was the first time this year the RiverRunners had floated this stretch from SRFP to the Hazen Bridge to monitor the float conditions.

Highlights of the trip included the Heronry at the new Heron View Forest Preserve, and the historic Hazen Bridge, a new acquisition by our Forest Preserve District with a promise of a new kayak launch site coming soon. For the botany-oriented, we spotted two large stands of climbing rose, possibly Illinois Rose (*Rosa setigera*) with a conservation value of 7, and dozens of halberd leaf rosemallow (*Hibiscus laevis*) along the river banks between the Sangamon River Forest Preserve and the Heron View Forest Preserve.

Duck Race 2022

The USRC will be holding its 12th Annual Duck Race Fundraiser this year. It began with a partnership between the USRC and Mahomet Parks & Rec in 2011. Starting this year, the USRC will be the sole operator and beneficiary of the race. The Duck Race has been our largest fundraiser since its beginning. Proceeds pay for many costs of our all-volunteer, not-for-profit, 501(c)3 organization as we strive to fulfill our mission: to preserve, maintain, monitor, and promote public use and awareness of the Sangamon River. Sponsorship of a rubber duck in the race is \$5.00 per chance. First Place is \$500.00 which has been generously donated by First Financial Bank.



The river measured 5 feet 8 inches at the Fisher Gage (always available from the USRC website), which is an acceptable water level for a float trip. Participants encountered a few minor blockages that they worked through and one significant blockage requiring a portage at a horseshoe in the river near the west boundary of Heron View.

The weather forecast was iffy, with a 40% chance of a shower that afternoon and stronger storms forecast for Saturday evening. It was therefore no surprise when it started to drizzle about an hour in and never let up until the trip was finished. The boaters were soaked by the time they reached the takeout!

Nonetheless, all were happy to be on the river and they ended in excellent (if damp) spirits. You can join the River Runners on their next river trip coming soon! Watch the website for upcoming float trips.

Second place is a chance to win either a kayak and paddle, or \$250.00 cash. Third place is \$100.00 cash, and last place is a duck in next years race.

The ducks are dropped from the old Rt. 150 Iron Bridge at 6pm on August 27 during the Mahomet Music Festival. You do not have to be present to win, but then who doesn't want to see hundreds of rubber ducks cascade off of the old iron bridge. 


